## FEBRUARY MEETING

On the last day of this month we are privileged to hear from a man who typifies a Northwest trend in chemical industry. Dr. A. W. Petrey, chief chemist of the Vancouver, Wash., plant of the Aluminum Company of America, would not be so accessible to us were it not for the realization, long-thought a fantastic dream, that electrochemical industries might logically center in the Northwest. Despite the press of duties associated with the establishment of a new laboratory and plant (and expansion of both as plans and construction were under way), Dr. Petrey has consented to address us on "Industrial Spectrochemistry". This topic is new and interesting and is one which is close and applicable to all fields of chemistry.

The meeting will be early (7:30) Friday evening in Room 131 Bagley Hall, University of Washington. As with all other meetings, it is open to the public.

Refreshments will be served immediately following the meeting. Everyone is invited to join the social hour or five minutes or however long one is inclined to stay.

## SECTION PUBLICATIONS

Many larger sections or groups of sections have printed bulletins, some of which are sent to this Section. What special features are or might be of interest? Could members assist in news gathering, as follows: could someone send in a review of the pulp and paper industry; chemistry in the Yakima Valley; a review of the fish oil industry, of glue and adhesive manufacture, of the cement industry, and so on? Such assistance and suggestions would be of great aid to an already burdened staff.
